
2019 CIHC PDS Event Floor Plan

They affixed buttons to their clothes with the phrase "What is an industrial hygienist?" and spent the day walking the Capitol corridors educating legislators and their staff about the profession. The results of these initial efforts ultimately led to Certified Industrial Hygienist (CIH) title protection, definition of industrial hygiene in the Business and Professions code, and additional regulatory and legislative recognition of the important role industrial hygienists play in the anticipation, recognition, evaluation, and control of hazards in the workplace and environment.

However, our work is never done. As new laws and regulations are proposed and as new legislators come and go, it is important for industrial hygienists to continue to be active in the process and to ensure our contributions continue to be recognized. The need to educate legislators and their staff about "What is an industrial hygienist?" is no less important today than it was almost three decades ago! I'll provide a summary of our work for 2019 in this year's CIHC update.

The CIHC Board represents you. The Board is regularly in need of technical advisors. The Board consults with technical advisors to gather information and details on specific issues that will assist the Board in commenting on proposed legislative bills and draft regulations. Technical advisors could also represent CIHC on Cal/OSHA Advisory Committees. What area of expertise is your professional passion? 

His responsibilities include the management and project planning for 6 senior level safety engineers and the development of technically complex occupational safety standards enforced throughout workplaces in California.

Prior to his employment with the Board, Mr. Manieri was employed by the Division of Occupational Safety and Health as an associate industrial hygienist with the Division of Occupational Safety and Health (compliance), the Governor's Office of Emergency Services, and the Toxic Substances Control Division of Cal-EPA as a hazardous materials specialist. Prior to joining the Board in 1985, Mr. Manieri spent several years in the private sector that included employment with SRI International, Employee Benefits Insurance Company as a Corporate Industrial Hygienist, a Bay Area worker compensation carrier, and the electronics industry which included director of Health and Safety for Avantek Inc., Of Santa Clara, and staff occupational safety and health specialist for Applied Materials, Inc. Mr. Manieri was the Program Manager of the Sacramento office of Safety Specialists Inc., of Santa Clara, California from 1984-1985.

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

In 2010, she received a Success Story award for advancing the goals of the USGS Science Strategy through the development and execution of the ShakeOut Scenario and Exercise. She represented Societal Impacts in the 2013 USGS Hazards Science Strategy Plan. This year, she and the HayWired scenario team received an award from the Bay Area Association of Governments/Metropolitan Transportation Commission for producing the most detailed earthquake scenario for use in their regional planning. She obtained a PhD in Decision Science from the Graduate School of Business, Stanford University, in 1988.
