He read the resolution, and the Senate passed it unanimously (the resolution SCR 44). Senator Pan then came over to our group at the back of the chambers and presented the framed resolution.

The Beta Group and my presentations are useful means by which AIHA members provide input into what government relations issues the Association should focus on, but they are by far not the only means. We also sent a Government Relations Survey out to all AIHA members. The survey will likely be closed by the time this is published, but in the event it's still open, please provide your feedback! The results of the survey will be published in the near future for all to view. At present, our government relations priorities are as follows:

- Congressional funding for OSHA, MSHA, NIOSH, and the Chemical Safety Board
- Strongly pushing against any attempts by Congress to halt implementation of OSHA's respirable crystalline silica rule
- · Regulatory reform
- Voluntary Protection Programs
- Infrastructure
- Title protection
- Teen workplace safety
- Worker health and safety in the marijuana industry

There are other areas that we get into, but it's safe to say that, for now, these are where we're focusing the bulk of our efforts, in addition to building internal infrastructure to encourage our members to have interactions with policymakers.

I'm looking forward to a bright future, and am truly honored to serve such passionate members who play a vital, intimate role in society!

An Update on Cal/OSHA's Indoor Heat Standard

On September 29, 2016 Governor Brown signed into law SB 1167, which was introduced by Senator Connie Leyva. The bill requires Cal/OSHA to adopt an indoor heat illness standard by January 1, 2019.

An OSHA Appeals Board decision seemed to be the impetus for the bill. Briefly, that case stemmed from a 2012 serious citation issued to two employers working in a warehouse setting where a worker experienced heat related injury while working inside a metal freight container where it was reported that temperatures reached over 100 degrees. DOSH cited both companies for not having an effective IIPP. The citation was appealed and the employers won their case. In March 2015, DOSH appealed the decision and in November 2015, the ALJ's decision was overturned by the Appeals Board, meaning the employers were responsible.

During the hearings, proponents stated

that employers simply do not maintain an adequate Injury and Illness Prevention Program where hazards are identified and corrective action taken and therefore a bill is needed to spell out details to prevent indoor heat related illnesses. Be that as it may, DOSH is now in the process of proposing a regulation on Indoor Heat and an Advisory Committee has been formed, of which CIHC is a member. To date, there have been two Advisory Committee meetings, the last one in May 2017 where regulatory language has been proposed. Some of the stakeholders believe that to develop an effective regulation, maybe the regulation should be focused on a particular industry, e.g., garment, warehousing, foundry, etc. That doesn't appear to be the direction Cal/ OSHA is taking. The latest draft states that the regulation "applies to all indoor places of employment where the dry bulb temperature equals or exceeds 85 degrees Fahrenheit" with the exception for workers who spend less than one hour per day indoors. The mechanism for evaluating heat would be the Heat Index used by the National Weather Service. Interestingly, one of the last changes to the bill before signing by the Governor was the addition of the ACGIH Threshold Limit Value for Heat which is not mentioned at all in DOSH's proposed regulation. Its absence is unclear. CIHC has submitted several comments to the bill to improve the definitions as well as to use the ACGIH TLVs to evaluate the workplace, as the bill states. Beyond the temperature trigger points for action, the proposed regulation reads very similar to the existing (outdoor) Heat Illness Standard including the need for a written program. We will keep you apprised on the iterations of this most interesting Cal/ OSHA regulation.

HEAC Report

The <u>Health Expert Advisory Committee</u>'s activities were terminated in 2012. This year the Health Effects Advisory Committee, the new HEAC, was initiated. Garrett Keating, Cal/OSHA's recently hired Staff Toxicologist, has been assigned to shepherd the HEAC function.

Changes from the previous HEAC are:

- HEAC will now determine the appropriate health effects exposure limits and the feasibility of achieving them.
 There no longer is a separate Feasibility Advisory Committee.
- The responsibility for finding published articles and presenting PEL

recommendations for HEAC consideration now lies with Dr. Keating. For each chemical under consideration one or two HEAC members will assist with Dr. Keating's review and preparation of a recommendation.

- The committee will meet quarterly
- Recommendations left over from the previous HEAC will be given first priority.
- At HEAC's new meeting on December 5, 2017 aluminum, manganese, hydrogen sulfide, peracetic acid and 2butoxyethyl acetate will be on the agenda.

Local Sections News

At the July dinner meeting of the local section, those in attendance heard from many of its Past Presidents and also heard about industrial hygiene outreach efforts both locally and overseas. Fifteen section Past Presidents dating back to 1979-1980 provided their lessons learned to new/aspiring professionals as well as to experienced persons who have practiced for several years. Some examples of their "words of wisdom" included: Don't be passive; Get involved in your/our professional community, such involvement provides opportunities for developing relationships, gaining everimportant leadership skills, expanding ones horizons, learning, opening doors, and networking; Learn and utilize risk communication skills; Never stop learning; Push yourself professionally & psychologically; and Remember that our common bond is protecting worker health.

Call for Abstracts Now Open for 2018 Total Worker Health Symposium The call for abstracts for the NIOSH-sponsored 2nd International Symposium to Advance Total Worker Health® is now OPEN. The upcoming symposium, focused on the theme Work & Well-Being: How Safer, Healthier Work Can Enhance Well-Being, will congregate scientists and practitioners engaged in innovative research and programs aligned with Total Worker Health approaches. The symposium will be held May 8–11, 2018, on the campus of the National Institutes of

Health in Bethesda, Maryland, just minutes from Washington, DC. NIOSH is seeking abstract submissions for poster presentations, plenary sessions, concurrent sessions (symposia and brief scientific paper or practice/intervention sessions), and pre-conference workshops. The deadline for abstract submission is October 31.

Study Looks at Effects of Organizational Safety Practices and Perceived Safety Climate on the Safe Administration of Liquid Antineoplastic Drugs A web-based survey conducted by NIOSH looked at how organizational factors and perceived safety climate might affect use of personal protective equipment and engineering controls as well as the likelihood of spills, leaks, or skin contact during administration of liquid antineoplastic drugs. Antineoplastic drugs, also known as chemotherapy, cytotoxic, and oncology drugs, are used to treat cancer, as well as arthritis, multiple sclerosis, and other non-cancer medical conditions. This study was published in the July issue of the Journal of Occupational and Environmental Hygiene and is currently available as an e-pub. Read more.

CIHC LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The Legislature is in year one of a new two-year session, and has adjourned for a summer recess after a busy seven months of bill introductions, hearings, floor sessions and negotiations to put out an on-time state budget. All bills introduced in this first half of session must be out of their house of origin to remain viable. Bills which have not been held in committee, (AKA, failed) will become two-year bills, which means that they can be taken up in January, when the second half of session begins. Along with several hundred two-year bills being carried over, there will be over two thousand new bills introduced.

CIHC reviews all new bill introductions, and decides which bills are candidates for our review and attention. This session the board reviewed some two hundred bills for possible action, and a total of 55 were identified as "of interest" and assigned to various board members who act as the point person on the bill and who review any amendments that are proposed.

Since January, some 20 bills on our CIHC legislative tracking list have been removed, either because they failed or they were amended and no longer pertained to the topic that was of interest.

The Legislature will return to Sacramento on August 21st, and will work long hours to make the September 15th deadline for passage of bills to be sent to the Governor for action. The Governor will have 30 days to sign, veto or allow bills to become law without his signature.

As Governor Brown carries out his duties during this last year of his term as Governor, the list of candidates interested in replacing him continues to grow. This will indeed be an interesting upcoming election as the new Governor and other elected officials will have the advantage of inheriting a healthy California economy, but the challenge of working with a new national administration on issues such as immigration, deportation, climate change, transportation, education, international trade and other topics crucial to California.
